


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80+ Bills Become Law - Minimum Wage to be Increased

More than 200 bills were enrolled to the Governor at the end of the 2014 legislative session on May 1. The Senate and House passed out 140+ bills on the last two session days, all of which are pending a decision by the Governor. More than 80 bills have become law.

Now that the session is over, the Governor is in that period where he has 45 days to decide on those bills passed by the legislature that have not yet become law. The deadline for the Governor's intent to veto any legislation is on **June 23**. **July 8** is the 45th day after adjournment at which time all remaining bills must be either signed into law, become law without the Governor's signature or be vetoed.

If any bill is vetoed, the legislature can come back in a one day special session to override the veto.

Some of the bills that were passed this session included:

HB 1700: The State Budget bill allocates more than \$23 billion in spending for state agencies and programs. As Senator Slom has repeatedly stated, the state budget is not an "austere" bill as other legislators have described. Upon further analysis, the Senate Minority Research Office found that the budget can be reduced by at least \$975 million in total spending. This finding was published in the Senate Minority's Alternative Budget that in April. Senator Slom voted agains the budget in final reading.

HB 1926: This is the bill that still allows law enforcement officers to engage in certain types of sexual acts in order for them to build a case and arrest prostitutes. The CD1 version of this bill has further muddled the waters of the original draft and could have far-reaching consequences that could negatively impact Hawaii's tourism industry.

SB 2866: This bill makes an appropriation of \$15 million to the much troubled Hawaii Health Systems Corporation (HHSC). Senator Slom voted "no."

Senator Slom also voted no on the following collective bargaining wage increase bills: **SB 2073** and **SB 2074**

HB 2590: Senator Slom also voted against the same day registration bill for Hawaii voters.

The Governor has already passed more than 80 bills into law. Among the bills signed into law by the Governor are the following:

SB 2609 (Act 82): Senator Slom voted against the minimum wage bill. This law will hurt business and employment opportunities and is not meant to be a living wage but rather a training wage. The new law will increase the minimum wage to \$10.10 over the next 4 years.

SB 2175 (Act 56): Authorizes the University of Hawaii to establish a two-year industrial hemp re-mediation and biofuel crop research program. See photo above.

SB 2768 (Act 76): Mandatory kindergarten for children of 5 years of age as of July 31.

HB 1866 (Act 61): HCDA requirements for hearing notices and Kaka'ako area building height limits.

Lassner New U.H. President

The University of Hawaii Board of Regents by a vote of 11 to 2 appointed **David Lassner** as the next President of the University of Hawaii System at a board meeting on Monday.

Lassner has been serving for more than a year as Acting President of the U.H. system after MRC Greenwood resigned. Lassner's appointment becomes effective on July 1 and he will get a \$375,000 annual salary.

Legislative Allowance Not Used by State Senator Sam Slom

On Monday, May 12, KHON TV Investigative Reporter **Gina Mangier**i reported on how State Legislators use their annual Legislative Allowance. Senator Slom has not used his annual allowance since first taking office in 1997. The KHON report focuses on legislative allowance expenditures for the last two years (2013 – 2014).

From her report:

"Over the past couple of years, Sen. **Malama Solomon**'s office (D-Hilo, Hamakua, Kohala, Waimea, Waikoloa, Kona) has turned in the most for allowance reimbursements at more than \$21,000. Sen. **Sam Slom** (R- Hawaii Kai, Kuliouou, Niu, Aina Haina, Waialae-Kahala, Diamond Head) has turned in the least — as in none...."

Since taking office in 1997 Senator Slom has not used his legislative allowance at all and has saved taxpayers more than \$118,000 between 1997 and 2013.

Minority NewsBytes & More

- Five constitutional amendment questions will appear on this year's general election ballot come this November. The following bills will be put forth as ballot questions to the voters: HB 420 Disclosure of the names of judicial nominees; HB 748 SPRBS for agricultural enterprises; SB 886 mandatory retirement age for judges @ 80 years; SB 1084 funding early childhood education; and SB 2876 SPRBS for dam and reservoir owners. SPRB = Special Purpose Revenue Bonds. More info on these ballot questions will appear in an upcoming report.
- The **primary election** this year will be on Saturday, Aug. 9.
- Hawaii is #4 in State Gas Taxes. A new survey by the Tax Foundation, Inc. lists each state by amount of state gasoline tax. Hawaii comes in #4 at 48.05¢ per gallon. California is #1 at 52.89¢. Lowest state is South Carolina at 16.75¢ per gallon. But wait, there's more. To the state rate, you must add both the General Excise Tax, Federal and City/County tax rates that boosts Hawaii even higher past 60¢.
- How does a bill become a law? Our Senate Minority Videogrpaher Kim Kepner Synbounmy and Noelani Bonifacio put together a video called "Life of a Bill".
